From the Desk of Mayor David Runfeldt

Who, What, Where, When, Why and How (the Heck are We Paying for It)?

INSIDE THIS ISSUE:

Most of the Borough operations are officially in their new homes as a result of the Municipal / Emergency Services Complex construction project that was started just over two years ago. Town Hall employees and police were the first to move into the new municipal building. The volunteers of Lincoln Park EMS and Fire Department Hose Company #2 have been responding to calls from their new headquarters for several weeks now. By the time you read this article, the driveway to Hose Company #1 should be paved and volunteers should be in full operation from there. The official building dedication for all four buildings happened on Lincoln Park Day and was very well attended by local dignitaries and a tremendous amount of residents.

I would like to take this time to discuss some important information regarding the history, facts and future of the project. First and foremost, to inform you that the project has stayed within the budget originally approved by council over 2 years ago.

The total project was budgeted by the town council at 23.5 million dollars. This budget covered most design costs, architectural fees, furnishings, communications and construction. Construction costs alone were just over 18.5 million for the project. This was for construction of all four buildings included in the project.

The original Hose Company #2 firehouse was built in the 1940's by members of the fire company. The metal apparatus bays were added in the early 1980's. For several years, the upper floor of Hose Company 2 was unavailable for public use due to the structural condition of the building.

The First Aid Squad building was actually a donated sales trailer from one of the housing developments that took place in Lincoln Park in the early 1960's. Over the years, members of the FAS added on to the building to make room for the increasing membership and necessary equipment. This building, too, had some serious structural issues 40 years later.

Hose Company #1's original building was the most structurally sound of all of the buildings, however, it was severely undersized for today's fire equipment. As a matter of fact, the rescue boats that get used whenever there is a flood had to be housed in the meeting room of the firehouse.

The original Municipal Building aka "Boro Hall" was approved in the mid 1950's and dedicated in 1957. Over 20 years ago, Boro Hall was expanded through the use of "temporary" office trailers (which were still in use up to the demolition of the building) to house the Building, Planning and Health Departments. Around that time the Constance Midkiff Community Center which had been used for civic organizations and senior citizens meetings had to be used as office space for the finance department.

The new Municipal complex is approximately twice the square footage of the original building. Census statistics from 1950 show the population of Lincoln Park was 3,376 residents. In 1960 the population was 6,048. Today, Lincoln Park has nearly 11,000 residents, more than twice as many as when the original building was approved and constructed.

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Who, What, Where, When, Why and How

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Council committees responsible for exploring new facilities had been in existence for a dozen or more years. Several years ago, the committee at the time, felt that the climate was right for moving ahead with the project. Interest rates were at an all time low and the existing buildings were either insufficient in size for our use or troubled structurally. The committee explored many options from repairing existing buildings, adding on to existing buildings, a combination of new construction and repair, etc. Eventually, through administration, engineer and architectural recommendations at the time, it was decided that new construction was the most effective solution, and would provide years of service to the community.

In addition to the office and meeting space necessary for daily operations of the borough, there are many enhancements that will improve the services we can offer to the community. Included in the new complex is a community meeting room that is available for civic organizations to hold meetings. This space will also be used more for programs that the borough will offer residents, such as the Citizens Police Academy and Citizen's Advisory Board which have both just started using this room. A kitchen area has been added to help reduce the need to shut down our children's use of the gym and meeting room at the PAL Community Center during times of emergencies such as floods.

Additional monies from the project budget were used to furnish the buildings. Every attempt was made to re-use furniture that was in good enough condition. The OEM office, for example, is furnished with some of the better desks and cabinets that were in use in the old building. The PAL Community center will have stackable chairs from the FAS and Council Cham-

bers that are an improvement over the steel folding chairs which are currently used there.

Communications improvements were a large part of the additional monies budgeted for the project. Lincoln Park has now officially entered the 21st Century with the electronic, computer and communication improvements we have installed. These upgrades are for much more than just boro hall itself. We have improved our Emergency Responder communication network which is there to protect you and your property. The communications at the PAL Community center and the town garage / DPW have also been improved through this project, both of which will help with services the DPW and Recreation Department can offer to you. We have enhanced our internet capabilities which you will see more use of in the coming months. You will be able to see meeting agendas, review minutes from past meetings, get forms, and view budgets...all on line from the comfort of your home.

I hope that I have been able to provide you with some of the history of and necessity for the project. I have tried to explain the thought behind the need, size and cost of what was included. I would like to now discuss how we are going to pay for this project.

Through some sound financial planning on behalf of the borough taking advantage of debt that we had paid off during the construction, several million dollars have already been financed and started to be paid back with little or no increase in your tax bill for 2005 and 2006. Starting in 2007 we have started to make payments on the additional 19 million that we have to pay back. This accounts for a large part of the rather hefty increase you noticed in your tax bill a few months ago. However, this should be the last increase that you see in your taxes with regards to this project. We are working with financing the project through the Morris County Improvement Authority (MCIA) to insure that there be steady yearly payments from this point forward. By keeping the debt payment level each year, there will be NO additional increases in debt payments over what you paid this year. Please keep in mind this does not mean that your taxes will not go up in the future. Operating costs and additional capital purchases for the operation of the borough will still be necessary. However,

with regards to paying off the debt incurred as a result of this Municipal / EMS Complex project, there should be NO additional yearly increase in your taxes. Our goal of not having any additional increases going forward is dependant on approval of the local finance board and on the interest rate we get from the MCIA. We should have our approval and know in the next month or two what the interest rate is. The way economic indicators are looking, I am hopeful that we get a very good interest rate.

On September 17 at the Borough Council meeting many of our officers were recognized for jobs above and beyond the call of duty. The following officers were recognized:

Ptl. Rondanini and Ptl. Simone— Meritorious Service Award for their role in responding to and evacuating a residence on Northwest St. during a house fire.

Ptl. Grune, Sgt. W. Karback and Lt. Sundberg—Meritorious Service Award for their role in apprehending suspects in a stolen motor vehicle pursuit and arrest.

Ptl. Wenzel, Ptl Bailey and Sgt. Runfeldt—Lifesaving Award for a heart attack and CPR call on Gettysburg Way.

Ptl. Simone—Honorable Service Award for his role in a foot chase and apprehension of a burglary suspect on Curtis Drive.

Ptl. Rondanini, Sgt. Zoeller, Ptl. Ruggiero, Ptl. Ward—Honorable Service Awards for their roles in responding to and evacuating a residence during a house fire on Ferndale Ave.

Sgt. W. Karback, Ptl. Massaro, Ptl Ward and Ptl. Bailey—Meritorious Service Award for their role on the tragic structure fire on Homestead Lane in March during the middle of the night. The officers in the sub freezing temperatures went door to door when the structure was engulfed in flames and evacuated, work up and in some cases pulled people from their residence, literally saving their lives prior to the entire building being engulfed.

Dsgt. Hackett, Lt. Sundberg— Meritorious Service Award , during a fire on Robertson Way where a dryer had erupted in flames threatening to affect the numerous other units and residents in the building, the officers went into the smoke filled residence and extinguished the fire prior to it spreading to the entire building.

Sgt. J. Karback, Ptl. G. Bosland— Lifesaving Award for their role in administering CPR and defibrillation on Roome St. for a resident who had

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expired. The resident was revived and transported to Chilton Hospital alive.

I am extremely proud of these officers who display the best qualities of the department. The fact is we are a very busy police department, not all calls are of the criminal variety, many are public service, lifesaving medical calls, fire calls, traffic and safety and a myriad of other incidents. ALL of which our officers have to be trained and ready for. Unlike a large department we do not have the luxury of specialization which makes our officers all the more deserving of acclaim as they are trained to handle anything that comes at them. As can be viewed from the aforementioned they are very good at what they do. I am proud and honored to lead such a terrific group of men and women.

Now that school is in full swing and October has arrived please take an extra moment while driving and be aware of children and pedestrians crossing the roadways. Motorists are reminded that pedestrians in crosswalks have the right of way and motorists must stop and allow them to cross. Later this month will be Halloween and we ask that citizens please keep the safety of our children in mind when operating vehicles during that time.

Accreditation update. The police department is still moving forward and should get the initial examinations of our agency during accreditation. This is a standard we believe will be demanded of police departments by its citizens in the coming years. Capt. Thomas Andrascik and I have been working hard on this. We expect to become one of the first 25 agencies within the State of New Jersey to earn this status out of 587 law enforcement agencies. It is a long and arduous process that tells a community their department adheres to best practices in all its operations.

Currently the best parallel would be Universities and Hospitals who must adhere to a best practice standard. In fact the public at large has come to expect this standard of such institutions, the same will hold true for law enforcement in the future.

Curb Appeal

Have you seen the television show “Curb-Appeal?” The show is based upon how important an initial impression is upon a property. I was coming into Lincoln Park the other day and I looked at this house, the property was well maintained, the house was neat, the lawn was cut—but they had weeds at the curb line almost one foot high. I stopped and looking at the house and all I could see, or think about was how awful the weeds looked.

I went home, looked at my curb line and had a rude awakening. I needed to start paying attention to my curb line, they were not as bad, but they needed to be cleaned up.

I started looking at the properties that the Department maintains within the Borough of Lincoln Park and guess what—we had to start cleaning up our curb lines too.

There are three steps to follow: first don't blow the grass clippings out into the roadway. Second, trim grass that is growing between the curb and the pavement. Lastly spray a product like Round-up to kill any weeds that may be coming up.

Feel free to contact me if there is a borough owned property that is not being maintained, I'll make sure we get on it.

Call Before You Dig!

The Underground Facility Protection Act, better known as the "One Call Law," was signed into law in October 1994. This law requires that anyone digging must call 1-800-272-1000 or 811, so that operators can mark-out their underground utilities. Anyone digging (Schools, Police, Public Safety, Public Works, Municipalities and Homeowners) to install, remove or replace trees, tree stumps, curbs, street and sign posts, mailbox posts, fences, construct decks, additions, or create new gardens, etc. must call 1-800-272-1000 or 811.

The One-Call system will notify the operators of underground facilities to markout your planned activity. You must wait three business days for your mark out and not more than 10 days before you start your project. Your notification is good for 45 business days. The person/company doing the excavation is required to call the Center. The information needed to process your request is as follows: Name, address, the dig address and the nearest intersection, how deep you are digging, the type of work and where you need the property marked out. You cannot work outside the scope of work stated on your request. You must hand dig within 2 feet of markouts before using mechanized equipment. Be sure to have this information available when you call the Center. You will receive a ticket number, which you should keep until your project is safely completed.

The One Call Center is not responsible for the markouts. If you should find that your property has been marked, it means that someone has requested that utilities markout in your area. This is done for your safety.

For your information the color code markings for utilities are: Red-electric; yellow-gas, oil, dangerous materials, product & steam lines; Orange-CATV communication; Blue-water; Green-sewer; White-proposed excavation.

Here's How It Works in a Nutshell:

- Always call the One Call Center prior to digging within the time frame. **1-800-272-1000 or 811.**
- Be ready with all-important information: The municipality, street address, extent of work, caller's name, contact person name, address and phone numbers.
- Then, wait for the site to be marked! Marking could be paint, flags or stakes.
- Respect and protect the facility operator's marks. Note the color of all markings used and what type of facilities they indicate.
- Dig with care! Always hand dig within 2 feet on either side of any marked lines.
- If damage, dislocation, or disturbance of an underground utility line occurs, immediately notify the affected facility, utility or pipeline.
- If damage creates an emergency, take immediate steps to safeguard health and property.

Results of not calling:

- Personal injury, including loss of life
- Damage to the environment
- Costly property damage
- Damage to these utilities lines: communication (i.e. telephone, long distance communications, cable television, 911 emergency, fire and police communication), electric, gas, pipelines, sewer, traffic signals and water lines
- Costly delays and expensive repairs
- Legal problems
- Civil penalties
