## Police News

In late October the Morris County Chiefs of Police Association and the Morris County Board of Education teamed up to start an enforcement and education campaign aimed at drivers covered under the graduated drivers license laws. If you are covered by this or have children affected by this please pay particular attention.

There have been several tragedies in Morris County and beyond through the state of New Jersey over the past year and a half involving younger drivers. It is vitally important this issue gets addressed. The flaunting or lack of knowledge of this law has literally cost some young people their lives. Below is an excerpt from the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission.

### **Are there restrictions when I have a permit or a provisional license?**

- **Student Permit (eligible age 16)** drivers must be accompanied by a NJ licensed driver, 21 years or older and licensed for at least 3 years.

Driving hours are restricted to 5:01 am to 11 pm. They may only have passengers from shared residence plus one additional person.

- **Provisional License (eligible age 17)** drivers can drive between 5:01 am to midnight. They may only have passengers from their shared residence plus one additional person. (If Provisional License holder is under 21 and any passenger is 21 or older, passenger restrictions don't apply. If Provisional License holder is 21 or over, passenger and hour restrictions don't apply.)

- **Examination Permit (eligible age 17)** drivers must be accompanied by a NJ licensed driver, 21 years or older and licensed for at least 3 years.

Driving hours are restricted to 5:01 am to midnight. They may only have passengers from their shared residence plus one additional person. (If permit holder is under 21 and any passenger is 21 or older, passenger restrictions don't apply. If permit holder is 21 or older, passenger and hour restrictions don't apply.) *Continued on page 10*

- Local property taxes are due Feb 1<sup>st</sup>, May 1<sup>st</sup>, August 1<sup>st</sup> and November 1<sup>st</sup>. There are ten grace days with each quarter. If the 10<sup>th</sup> falls on the weekend or holiday it goes to the next business day. Tax bills are billed once a year (beginning of July) and have four quarters on it (3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of current year and 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> of the next year).
- Deductions are available for Veterans, Senior Citizens and Disabled. Please call the Tax Collector's office at (973)270-2061 to inquire about these deductions. Applications are available at the Tax Collector's office.
- Homestead Rebate checks were mailed to Senior Citizens and Disabled in early August. Homestead Rebate checks were mailed to all others the week of 9/17/07. Please double check that you received your checks.
- Senior Tax Freeze checks were mailed in late July. If you have not received your Homestead Rebate or your Senior Tax Freeze checks then please call the State to inquire about your refund.

## History of Lincoln Park

### The Borough

"The period 1920 to 1940 witnessed an extraordinary growth and the character of the town changed from a rural village to a suburban community.

From the time of its creation in 1750 to 1921 there had been six divisions away from Pequannock Township, the most recent ones being Kinnelon and Riverdale. The political importance of the township had therefore been greatly diminished. It was not always convenient to go to Pompton Plains to vote although free transportation was provided. The sentimental political ties with township officers meant little to the voters who had only recently come into the township. Citizens of Lincoln Park had been agitating and considering the question of separation into its own borough for several years. The question was a highly controversial one, splitting the dominant Republican party into two factions, with most of the older residents favoring the township form of government.

In 1921, a bill was passed by the state legislature authorizing a referendum to create a Township of Lincoln Park. The proposed township included the area up to Sunset Road in Pequannock.

This Referendum was defeated at the polls, most of the dissident votes being cast in Pequannock.

Later the same year, authority was again granted by the legislature to submit the question of withdrawal to a referendum. This time calling for a Borough of Lincoln Park, with the boundary moved south to the edge of the Parson's Farm (now Comly Estates).

A Special election was held on April 26, 1922.

On the eve of the referendum it was by mere accident discovered that a last minute effort would be made to frame the election by the addition of 46 new names to the voting list,

The new names being mostly summer residents. These names were not on the registry list at which the original petition for the referendum was made to the legislature.

Mr. George Smith made a hurried trip to the Morristown home of Supreme Court Justice Parker, and secured a writ of mandamus forcing the election board to use the original voting list.

But the seal of the court had to be affixed before the writ would be legal. This meant a long night trip to Trenton in the days when we did not have the fine highways we presently enjoy.

Supreme Court Clerk Kear was woken up near midnight and driven down to the Supreme Court Chambers where the official court seal was affixed.

When the new voters appeared at the polls they were turned away.

When the ballot boxes were opened, and the paper ballots were counted, the question had carried by a margin of 10 votes out of 502 votes cast, 3 ballots being thrown out. It was said that the vote was running a tie until the last 12 ballots were counted.

The carrying of the borough referendum was due to the efforts of Mr. Thomas Kennedy (later Mayor Kennedy) and a small group of citizens consisting of: Walter Sievers; Warren Kitchell; Irving Reycraft; George Smith; Louis Schwartz; Lou F. Stilwell; Frank Headley; David Benjamin; and George Mitchenfelder.

#### Did you know:

- In the US, there are more than 200 million cellular phones currently in use.
- The average American cell phone user owns 3 or more cell phones
- The average life span of a cell phone is only 18 months
- It is estimated that 130 million cell phones will become obsolete and discarded each year and there are now in excess of 600 million cell phones that will be stockpiled in US homes
- The circuit boards in cell phones contain myriad toxins such as arsenic, antimony, beryllium, cadmium, copper, lead, nickel, and zinc
- Brominated flame retardants are found in the plastic housing, printed wiring board, and cables
- The lithium-ion and nickel-metal hydride batteries contain heavy metal such as cobalt, zinc, and copper
- Many of these chemicals are Persistent Bioaccumulative Toxins (PBT's) and have the potential to be released into the air and ground water when burned in incinerators or disposed of in landfills, thus creating unnecessary threats to human health and the environment
- Less than 5% of obsolete cell phones are refurbished or recycled
- In a recent survey, only 2.3% of Americans recycled their old cell phones and 7% threw them in the garbage

Phones which no longer have any commercial value are recycled using processes which place NO materials in landfills. Some phones are do-

nated to government agencies and abuse shelters to be used for emergency situations. Other phones are refurbished and sold to wireless retailers in the United States and other countries.

Regardless of the way the phones we collect are utilized, they do not contribute to the growing problems from wireless waste.

### What else should I know?

Everyone in the vehicle must wear safety belts—it's the law. The use of any interactive wireless communication device is prohibited while operating a moving vehicle (except in an emergency situation) on a GDL permit or provisional license.

Never use alcohol or drugs when driving. There's a \$100 fine for violation of any of the conditions of the permits or provisional license. Hours of operation waivers are available in certain emergency situations, for work and religious activities.
