I feel that this draft from the NJLOM paints a very good picture of how we are affected on a municipal level and how the differences between the public and private sectors affect the way we do things – especially as elected officials of a local government,

RESPONSE TO ECONOMIC CRISIS FROM THE NJ LEAGUE OF MUNICIPALITIES

The current market crisis has put the Federal and state governments on the fiscal defensive. Headlines trumpet massive bailouts of the private sector and mid-course corrections in revenue anticipations and spending priorities.

Some pundits warn local leaders, "Hard times are coming. Prepare for the worst. You face some tough choices. Look at how business responds to these problems. You'll need to learn to do less with less."

We appreciate the pundits concern and will take their warnings to heart. But they need to consider the following.

Municipalities are not businesses. They do not operate on the profit motive. Those that fund and receive our services are not stockholders or customers. They are citizens. And the decisions that are made by local elected officials are not directed toward doing better, financially, than the competition. They are instead directed toward doing the common good.

The private sector can cut back, lay-off and even relocate, if that suits its bottom line. Stockholders can invest in either this company or that company or both or neither, if that suits their bottom line. And customers often have even more options.

Local elected officials, while they cannot relocate the government, could save money by cutting back on services and by laying-off employees. But the common good might mean more than saving money. It might, in fact, mean spending money. Streets and neighborhoods need to be patrolled. Pot holes need to be filled. Refuse needs to be disposed of. And utilities that use the public rights-of-way to deliver water, power, communications and entertainment services need to be regulated and monitored.

And while citizens might be able to relocate, at each moment of their existence, they will find themselves somewhere. And while there, they will have to count on a particular local jurisdiction to patrol a particular street and neighborhood, to fill particular potholes, to dispose of site-specific refuse and to regulate and monitor certain specific utilities regarding their use of particular rights-of-way.

Local governments operate under legal, practical, moral and ethical standards that are very different from those encountered by the private sector. Private profit and the common good are not just different things. They are different things that operate under different rules on different levels.

And governments need to do the things they have to do to promote the common good so that private businesses can do the things they need to do in order to make a profit. The common good precedes profits, logically and morally. And that's not just us talking. See the preamble to the Constitution. Read the Declaration of Independence. Or consider the ultimate sacrifices willingly made by generations of soldiers, sailors, airmen, marines and guardsmen.

This is not to say that local elected officials shouldn't care at all about economy and efficiency. They should and they do. Nor is it to say that they shouldn't consider lay-offs and services cuts. For years now, they have and will continue to do so.

As the Federal government has slashed cooperative funding programs and as the State of New Jersey has refused to honor its statutory commitment to municipal property tax relief and public school aid funding increases, local officials have thoughtfully struggled to balance local service demands with even more forceful demands for property tax relief.

Maybe the reason the headlines don't trumpet dramatic pronouncements of draconian cuts from local officials is because, for them, the current economic downturn is only the latest challenge that they have faced. Having engaged now for years in annual bouts of budgetary triage, this latest casualty, while meriting careful attention, does not require any major change in standard operating procedure.

The current economic crisis was not caused by New Jersey municipalities spending too much. It was not caused by any level of government spending too little on regulation and monitoring of the private financial markets. And many, it seems, now believe that it can only be solved by the public sector spending more – a lot more – on a bail-out of failing private sector businesses.

Lay-offs and cut backs may be good news for executives and investors. But the unemployed worker may have trouble

seeing that. Sometimes, just maybe, the common good requires the public sector to look to a different bottom line.

Police News

In early October Lincoln Park Police, Fire and EMS responded to a confined space rescue at the TBSA pumping station at Ryerson Rd and Rt 202. With the assistance of numerous specialists from surrounding fire districts the two workers who had fallen approximately 15-20' and sustained injuries were successfully rescued.

Special recognition has to be given to Lincoln Park Firefighter Gunther, Sgt. William Karback, Ptl. Herbek and Ptl. Wenzel who entered the confined space area and tended to the victims until their successful rescue and transport to the emergency room by Lincoln Park EMS. It was a first rate operation by all the services working together.

Also occurring in mid October was the sighting of a large black bear wandering through the Chapel Hill Rd Highland Ave area of town. While this normally is not very alarming the fact that the elementary school was dismissing at that very time and school buses were en route to drop children off was a concern.

Sgt William Karback, Ptl. Herbek, Lt. Sundberg, Sgt Runfeldt, Dsgt Hackett and Disp. Viviani did a tremendous job of walking the children to their homes to ensure their safety and alerting the area residents via reverse 911.

There was some concern expressed as to why Lincoln Park Police did not shoot the animal. The fact is that police do not wantonly shoot wild animals. If the bear became an imminent threat to any human being we have personnel trained in black bear encounters and have measures ranging from rubber buckshot to lethal measures in order to protect citizens. That being said most black bears do not want to be near people either and eventually wander their way toward wooded areas.

Below are some safety tips derived from the NJ Division of Fish and Wildlife

Never feed or approach a bear!

- Remain Calm
- Make the bear aware of your presence by speaking in an assertive voice, singing, clapping your hands, or making other noises.

If a bear enters your home, provide it with an escape route by propping all doors open.

- Avoid direct eye contact and never run from a bear. Instead, slowly back away.
- To scare the bear away, make loud noises by yelling, banging pots and pans or using an airhorn. Make yourself look as big as possible by waving your arms. If you are with someone else, stand close together with your arms raised above your head.
- The bear may utter a series of huffs, make popping jaw sounds by snapping its jaws and swat the ground. These are warning signs that you are too close. Slowly back away, avoid direct eye contact and do not run.
- If a bear stands on its hind legs or moves closer, it may be trying to get a better view or detect scents in the air. It is usually not a threatening behavior.
- Black bears will sometimes "bluff charge" when cornered, threatened or attempting to steal food. Stand your ground, avoid direct eye contact, then slowly back away and do not run.

- A left onto Pleasant ave and another left onto Washington Street.
- The runners will make a right onto Bog & Vly Lane and go all the way to the end and a left onto Beaverbrook Road.

- The race will end approximately in the location of Greater Community Bank and Blockbuster Video area.

In ending I hope and wish everyone a Happy Thanksgiving this year and remember those in this town and the country who have suffered much. As always we should remember in our prayers the brave men and women serving overseas during this Holiday season our own Specialist William Morere (LPPD) is serving in Iraq and our thoughts and prayers are always with him and his unit as it is with all of our brave men and women serving under arms.

First Ladies of the White House

Rachel Donelson Jackson 19th Century

"Wearing the white dress she had purchased for her husband's inaugural ceremonies in March 1829, Rachel Donelson Jackson was buried in the garden at The Hermitage, her home near Nashville, Tennessee, on Christmas Eve in 1828. Lines from her epitaph—"A being so gentle and so virtuous slander might wound, but could not dishonor"—reflected his bitterness at campaign slurs that seemed to precipitate her death.

Rachel Donelson was a child of the frontier. Born in Virginia, she journeyed to the Tennessee wilderness with her parents when only 12. At 17, while living in Kentucky, she married Lewis Robards, of a prominent Mercer County family. His unreasoning jealousy made it impossible for her to live with him; in 1790 they separated; and she heard that he was filing a petition for divorce.

Andrew Jackson married her in 1791; and after two happy years they learned to their dismay that Robards had not obtained a divorce, only permission to file for one. Now he brought suit on grounds of adultery. After the divorce was granted, the Jacksons quietly remarried in 1794. They had made an honest mistake, as friends well understood, but whispers of adultery and bigamy followed Rachel as Jackson's career advanced in both politics and war. He was quick to take offense at, and ready to avenge, any slight to her.

Scandal aside, Rachel's unpretentious kindness won the respect of all who knew her—including innumerable visitors who found a comfortable welcome at The Hermitage. Although the Jacksons never had children of their own, they gladly opened their home to the children of Rachel's many relatives. In 1809 they adopted a nephew and named him Andrew Jackson, Jr. They also reared other nephews; one, Andrew Jackson Donelson, eventually married his cousin Emily, one of Rachel's favorite nieces.

When Jackson was elected President, he planned to have young Donelson for private secretary, with Emily as company for Rachel. After losing his beloved wife he asked Emily to serve as his hostess.

Though only 21 when she entered the White House, she skillfully cared for her uncle, her husband, four children (three born at the mansion), many visiting relatives, and official guests. Praised by contemporaries for her wonderful tact, she had the courage to differ with the President on issues of principle. Frail throughout her lifetime, Emily died of tuberculosis in 1836.

During the last months of the administration, Sarah Yorke Jackson, wife of Andrew Jackson, Jr., presided at the mansion in her stead."
