From the Desk of Mayor David Runfeldt

Lincoln Park's former Chief Financial Officer, who resigned last month to take the same position in Rockaway Township, was charged on February 14th with stealing over \$10,000.00 from a borough bank account. Dennis Gerber who was hired by the borough 10 years ago was charged with official misconduct and theft.

Mr. Gerber tendered his resignation on Friday, February 8th and was asked to vacate his office that day. On the next day of business, Monday, February 11th, borough employees in the finance department received bank statements which showed questionable transactions. The Borough Administrator and I were provided with the statements for review and subsequently notified the police department that there was a possibility of misconduct. At question was the apparent diversion of funds from a borough account which Mr. Gerber made directly to himself.

The Mayor's Office immediately notified the Lincoln Park Police Department, which resulted in a joint investigation with the Morris County Prosecutor's Office.

The initial phase of the investigation revealed that Mr. Gerber misappropriated Borough funds for his personal benefit, in an amount exceeding \$10,000.00.

Mr. Gerber was arrested and charged by members of the Lincoln Park Police Department and the Morris County Prosecutors Office. The investigation is continuing.

We are expecting that this is an isolated occurrence of devious behavior by one individual. However, the residents of Lincoln Park can be assured that we are dedicated to investigating any and all possible ways Mr. Gerber may have had the potential of additional abuse in the ten years since he was hired to be the CFO of the borough.

Any deceit by a public employee is a tremendous insult to the community which that individual has pledged to serve. No matter how large or small the dollar amount may be, deception by a borough employee will not be tolerated. Early last year, during my first few weeks as mayor, I responded to a resident inquiry about possible corruption in Lincoln Park. My response at the time was that, although there were no obvious signs of dishonesty, I was committed to constant vigilance in all areas of borough operations and guaranteed swift, strong action if any betrayal of the public trust was found.

One of the most successful means which the borough has to get important news and information immediately to our residents is through the newsgroup email service. Please make sure that you are signed up for this great tool and also encourage your friends and family in town to subscribe. News, updates and special events information from the borough are often sent directly to residents via email. Library Corner

The Lincoln Park Public Library is located at 12 Boonton Turnpike. Our hours of operation are as follows: Monday – Thursday: 10am – 9pm; Friday: 10am – 5pm; Saturday: 9:30am – 4pm; and Sunday: 12pm – 5pm. The library will be closed March 21-23 (from Good Friday through Easter).

AARP Volunteers/Tax Preparers will be at the library on Tuesdays and Thursdays until April 15. Appointments are necessary for this free service. Appointments run from 10am through 2pm. Call the library at 973-694-8283 to make an appointment.

SAM has been installed on the library's public computers. You will need a valid library card and pin number to access the PCs. You will be automatically blocked from using the computers if you owe in excess of 5 dollars in fines. Patrons who need to print will need to set up an account at the circulation desk. Each time you print a page an amount will be deducted from your account (10 cents per page for black and white printouts and 25 cents per page for color). You will not be allowed to print if you have no money or insufficient funds in your account. You will also have a limited amount of time to use the public computers per day. You will get a warning before your session expires. PCs will shut down automatically at the end of the day after a warning is given. SAM libraries in M.A.I.N., Inc. also include Morristown/Morris Township, Madison, Library of the Chatham, East Hanover, Dover, Wharton, and Boonton Holmes.

Besides our monthly Friends of the Library book sale, Annual Lincoln Park Day Book Sale (also Friends of the Library), periodic dinosaur pit book sale (staff), the library is also now collecting books to benefit the Montville Pet Parents, Inc. (MPP). This organization will sell the books collected in their special bin to benefit the animals in the Montville Animal Shelter and to help in the building of a new shelter.

The Montville Animal Shelter serves the town of Lincoln Park, Montville, Mountain Lakes, Boonton Township, and

D.A.R.E. - Our Community Policing Officers are starting the 17th year of D.A.R.E. in conjunction with the Lincoln Park Schools. It has been a tremendous relationship, which we are very proud of, and one that we know has touched the lives of many children, their parents and the officers.

Bicycle, Skateboarding and Rollerblading Helmet laws - With warmer weather on the way there will be several enforcement initiatives. The first will be the reminders to all youths under the age of 14 that when riding a bicycle, skateboard or rollerblading it is mandatory to wear a helmet. Many head injuries sustained each year can be prevented simply by using this equipment. In New Jersey, anyone under 14 years of age that rides a bicycle or is a passenger on a bicycle, or is towed as a passenger by a bicycle must wear a safety helmet. Parents should take extra care to ensure their children are properly equipped.

Pedestrians within Crosswalks - Of special concern to us is the lack of yielding to pedestrians within crosswalks. Under N.J.S.A. 39:4-36 this is an offense of failing to stop and yield to a pedestrian crossing the street within a crosswalk. Oftentimes we see the failure of motorists to abide by this law, which leaves the pedestrians in a precarious position in a roadway. On the other side of this law is the requirement that pedestrians actually utilize the provided sidewalks.

Flood Gauges - Two years ago I was very proud to announce the police department had obtained funding for the in river electronic flood gauges to provide early warning for our residents. They were very relevant during last years flooding. The gauges can be found at this link:

Attempted Burglary

At 6:54pm, on May 15, 2007, the Lincoln Park Police Department responded to Stonyridge Drive within the Pinebrook Village Condo Complex. There was damage to a sliding glass door and a screen on a window, which appear to have been caused by a screwdriver or similar object. Entry was not gained into the residence. The attempt was believed to have been made between the hours of 8:30 AM and 6:00 PM.

Let me please start off by apologizing to all the voters in Lincoln Park, for the voting problems at the February 5, 2008 Presidential Primary.

The decision to move the polling place from the PAL Building to the new Municipal Building was mine and mine alone. There were many factors in my decision making process:

- In the summer month of our June Primaries, it is extremely hot in the gym for both the Poll Workers and the voters.
- In the winter month for our General Elections, it is cold in the gym for both the Poll Workers and the voters.
- The blue tarp on the floor with tape running across the seams was a danger.
- By having the voting in the gym of the PAL Building, the children and parents could not have use of the gym, kitchen or meeting room.
- Use of Borough Field would have to cease on that particular election-day.
- Parking was of course the worse problem of all.

By moving the voting to the new municipal complex, I felt all of the above problems would be resolved. I suggested the change to the County offices they of course have to approve any voting place change. They came down, looked at the room thought it was great, I reminded them that I had 16 voting machines and 32 Poll Workers at most elections, they said everything would fit. I still had my concerns, but we moved forward with my plan. Needless to say my plan did not work out very well

and once again I apologize for it.

By 10 pm on the night of the Presidential Primary I had already e-mailed a letter to the County asking to consider separating the Wards, Ward 1 & 2 would remain in the Community Meeting Room while Wards 3 & 4 would be voting in Hose Co. #1, this would mean only 8 machines and 16 Poll Workers in each building, therefore making your voting experience a pleasant one. I still need County approval for yet another change.

As the Borough Clerk and the Election Official for the Borough of Lincoln Park, my primary concern on election day is you the voter, my goal was to make your voting experience a pleasant one, unfortunately it did not work out that way.

Please accept my deepest apology to all of you including all the Poll Workers, my goal is to let all of you vote and have a pleasant experience doing so. I am hoping that this new change, if approved, will result in a happier experience for all concerned.

The Borough

“Under the administration of Mayor William P. Clark construction of a new municipal building was commenced in 1957 and was formally dedicated July 2nd, 1958, the Hon. Peter H. B. Frelinghuysen being the principal speaker. “

Following the Comly Estates development was Lin Park in 1963. This was an attractive community in the Bog & Vly section. Lyn Park was followed in 1967 by Beaverbrook Gardens, a complex of 360 apartments bordering Comly Road and Park Avenue.

The growth for the 10 years from 1930 to 1940 was 355. From 1940 to 1960 the increase was 3500 or 79% since 1950. The official 1970 census was 8946 an increase of about 48% over 1960. The borough ranked 16th in population in the county most of the increase was north of the railroad tracks in Lin Park and Beaver Brook Gardens. The borough is nearly 7 square miles in area.

Anticipated was the continued growth and prosperity of the borough, one of the Boonton banks opened its first out of town branch in Lincoln Park in 1958.

In 1962 Comly Road was extended to Rt. 202, the old municipal building demolished. In 1963 Rt. 202 was straightened by cutting through from Chapel Hill and following the route of the old canal bed, Hose Co. #1 stands there now.

In 1964 the state tercentenary was observed with ceremonies. Under the auspices of a local committee a state flag was made by Mrs. H.L. Greenfield and flown daily outside of the municipal building. The State historymobile made two appearances and an antique display by the Jaycees was shown in one of the stores. The local Women’s Club awarded two government bonds for the two best essays on local history written by an 8th grader or high school student.

After the contest in the schools, Lincoln Park adopted the design submitted by Robert Laughlin (a 5th grader) as its official seal.

Greater recreational facilities were accorded the town in 1965 when it took over the body of water along Ryerson Road which was previously known as The Community Swim Club. A year later the town acquired the former Regetz

Property on Pine Brook Rd, as a recreation center.

The rapid growth also brought with it the problems of proper sanitary facilities and higher taxes, due mainly to the necessity for increased school facilities.

In the 1967 a citizen’s group proposal to change the form of government to Council-Manager Plan B was defeated 636 to 1365. This issue prompted the 1968 election of a Charter Study Commission. The Commission proposed another change in the Borough’s form of government, which was approved 1146 to 1057 in the 1969 elections. The new form was Mayor-Council Plan F of the Faulkner Act. It calls for a Mayor and 3 Councilmen elected at large and 4 more Councilmen elected from each of 4 Wards in the town. All have 4 year terms, which are staggered, with elections held every 2 years. The At-Large officials running at the same time and the Ward Councilmen running at the same time.

The Mayor supervises the Administration of the Borough appointing up to 12 Directors to oversee the different Departments; Police, Finance, Fire, Public Works, etc.

The Council Legislates, deciding policy questions and passes Ordinances.

The Mayor, with the assistance of the Administrator, prepares the Municipal Budget and submits it to the Council for approval.

With Spring just around the corner, it's time to remind everyone of the possibility of flooding in many areas of town. Heavy spring rains and spring thaws can bring about flooding and flood related problems.

Flash Flooding: Remember, when a roadway is under water “Turn Around, Don’t Drown”. If you are experiencing flash flooding in your area keep a careful eye on the situation. If the water is encroaching your property please be sure you move important papers and personal belongings above ground level. Make sure that all light lawn furniture is secured. Do not attempt to drive through the water – wait until it recedes.

River and Stream Flooding: River and Stream flooding lasts much longer and has a greater chance of impact on personal property. If the streams and/or rivers are rising keep a close eye on the situation. Resources are listed below that will help you in determining what the situation is and what the potential might be. If evacuation is necessary please remember that we will do assisted evacuations only during daylight hours unless there is a medical emergency. It is always best to plan an evacuation route and prepare for evacuation ahead of time.
