From the Desk of Mayor David Runfeldt

In our 2008 Budget, we have experienced significant increases that are outside of our control and are causing significant stress to our budget. Our mandated contributions to state employee pension plans have increased by nearly one quarter of a million dollars as the state continues to work it way out of a pension mess created decades ago. The borough incurred a half million dollars in emergency and clean up costs during last April's Nor'easter with **NO** Public Assistance from FEMA or reimbursement from the State government. We are required to increase funding to our library and the sewer authority. Cost of insurance and fuel continue to rise beyond our control. These few forced and uncontrolled items alone account for over \$700,000.00 of increase in a budget that has a TOTAL spending increase of just over \$900,000.00.

If you notice, I made no mention of Debt Service or Capital Improvement Projects in the above analysis. I did that to show that, contrary to occasional rumors around town, the new municipal complex is not the stress on the budget it is perceived to be. If, however, we were to remove the costs of our debt and anticipated capital improvements from the equation, the remaining spending increase this year is only \$22,000.00. Salaries have increased less than 1 ¼ percent this year and all other spending which we have some control over have actually decreased by \$46,000.00.

Basically what all of this means is that after State mandated pension contributions, increases to insurance, fuel and library costs, funding for the flood and an increase from TBSA, the borough government controlled tax increase is less than 3 tax points of a total 13 point increase.

Amazingly, however, we are faced with a tremendous tax increase. On top of the above mentioned spending increases, we are confronted with a great loss of funding from the State of New Jersey this year. The Governor intends to cut spending in the state's budget. As a local elected official, I know that cutting spending on the state level means less funding for municipalities. In turn, we are forced to fund these cuts through increasing your property taxes. All this accomplishes is to replace a progressive tax with a regressive tax. We have all known for quite some time that New Jersey is in financial difficulty. There are many reasons and many people who have contributed to the situation we find ourselves in the State of New Jersey. Difficult decisions must be made by those who lead us; however, the Governor's effort to solve the State's problems by penalizing many small municipalities such as Lincoln Park is placing a huge burden on us at the municipal level.

How much of a burden is yet to be seen. Currently Lincoln Park stands to lose a great deal in funding from the state which we have received in the past. The current tax bills use an estimated rate as we await the final decision on the budget from Trenton. If the Governor holds firm in cutting our money and our application for extraordinary aid is not approved, the municipal budget may be revisited. In a town where much of our ratable property is already developed, the current state budget cut would put us in a position where we may be forced to cut essential services to our residents. We are hopeful that we will be able to find a way to minimize your tax burden while at the same time continue to provide you with the services you desire and keep Lincoln Park one of the best places to live in New Jersey.

The governor has asked for assistance by encouraging the public to send him ideas regarding State spending cuts. You can do this by visiting the governor's website <http://www.nj.gov/governor/citizeninput/>. I, too, would like to encourage your ideas. If you have a suggestion on how we can make changes to our spending, or any thoughts for services please feel send them to residentideas@bolp.org.

On a final note, none of the above analysis or reasoning should be taken to be that I or any of the officials you have elected are comfortable with the budget increase we are confronted with. We also pay property taxes and an increase affects us just as much as any resident of town. Rest assured that we will do whatever we can to present a manageable budget this year and make sure that future budgets are not unnecessarily troubled.

The Lincoln Park American Legion Post 279 recently presented Hose Company Number One with a portable defibrillator. The unit will be carried on the first responding fire truck. Seconds and minutes count at a time when it might be needed. Thank you members of Post 279.

Emergency calls for the month of May started off slow and then peaked during a severe thunder storm with five calls in one day. Calls were received for wires down, electric conditions, and trees down. Volunteer man hours for the month came to 625 hours. Man hours are counted from the time the fire trucks leave the firehouse to the time they return.

Our ladder truck is now back in service. Like any motor vehicle, fire trucks need repairs also. While the truck was out of service, coverage for such a truck was provided by our friends in Pequannock.

Lincoln Park was one of several fire companies that responded to a mutual aid call for help when a tanker truck carrying a toxic chemical overturned on Route 23 in Riverdale. The road was closed for several hours until the spill could be contained.

- It increases the force of a crash and increases the likelihood of death.
- A 20 MPH crash will kill the pedestrian 5% of the time
- A 40 MPH crash will kill the pedestrian 85% of the time.

Jane Means Appleton Pierce

19th Century

"In looks and in pathetic destiny young Jane Means Appleton resembled the heroine of a Victorian novel. The gentle dignity of her face reflected her sensitive, retiring personality and physical weakness. Her father had died—he was a Congregational minister, the Reverend Jesse Appleton, president of Bowdoin College—and her mother had taken the family to Amherst, New Hampshire. And Jane met a Bowdoin graduate, a young lawyer with political ambitions, Franklin Pierce.

Although he was immediately devoted to Jane, they did not marry until she was 28—surprising in that day of early marriages. Her family opposed the match; moreover, she always did her best to discourage his interest in politics. The death of a three-day-old son, the arrival of a new baby, and Jane's apparent dislike of Washington counted heavily in his decision to retire at the apparent height of his career, as United States Senator, in 1842. Little Frank Robert, the second son, died the next year of typhus.

Service in the Mexican War brought Pierce the rank of brigadier and local fame as a hero. He returned home safely, and for four years the Pierces lived quietly at Concord, New Hampshire, in the happiest period of their lives. With attentive pleasure Jane watched her son Benjamin growing up.

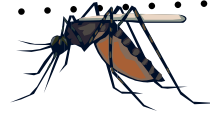
Then, in 1852, the Democratic Party made Pierce their candidate for President. His wife fainted at the news. When he took her to Newport for a respite, Benny wrote to her: "I hope he won't be elected for I should not like to be at Washington and I know you would not either." But the President-elect convinced Jane that his office would be an asset for Benny's success in life.

On a journey by train, January 6, 1853, their car was derailed and Benny killed before their eyes. The whole nation shared the parent's grief. The inauguration on March 4 took place without an inaugural ball and without the presence of Mrs. Pierce. She joined her husband later that month, but any pleasure the White House might have brought her was gone. From this loss she never recovered fully. Other events deepened the somber mood of the

new administration: Mrs. Fillmore's death in March, that of Vice President Rufus King in April.

Always devout, Jane Pierce turned for solace to prayer. She had to force herself to meet the social obligations inherent in the role of First Lady. Fortunately she had the companionship and help of a girlhood friend, now her aunt by marriage, Abigail Kent Means. Mrs. Robert E. Lee wrote in a private letter: "I have known many of the ladies of the White House, none more truly excellent than the afflicted wife of President Pierce. Her health was a bar to any great effort on her part to meet the expectations of the public in her high position but she was a refined, extremely religious and well educated lady."

With retirement, the Pierces made a prolonged trip abroad in search of health for the invalid—she carried Benny's Bible throughout the journey. The quest was unsuccessful, so the couple came home to New Hampshire to be near family and friends until Jane's death in 1863. She was buried near Benny's grave."



West Nile Virus

Since we are at the height of the mosquito season, we have concerns about West Nile Virus. Residents are advised to take precautions to reduce the risk of mosquito bites.

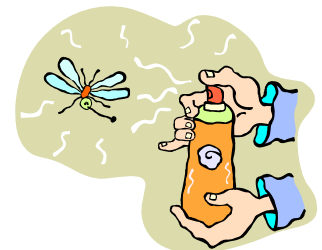
The West Nile Virus is transmitted through the bite of an infective mosquito that has picked up the virus while feeding on an infected bird. In a very small number of cases, West Nile Virus also has been spread through blood transfusions, organ transplants, breast feeding and even during pregnancy from mother to baby. There is no evidence that would indicate that West Nile Virus is transmitted directly from infected bird to humans. West Nile Virus can also seriously affect horses. Please contact your local veterinarian or New Jersey Department of Agriculture at <http://www.state.nj.us/agriculture/westnile.htm> for more information on West Nile Virus's effect on horses.

The West Nile Virus was first isolated and identified by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in September 1999 in dead birds in New York City and Westchester County. West Nile Virus infection generally causes mild flu-like symptoms. However, the elderly are at higher risk of more severe disease.

Morris County residents may report mosquito problems and standing water to the Morris County Mosquito Commission at 973-538-3200. The Morris County Mosquito Commission website also provides up-to-date information on where and when mosquito spraying will be occurring. As a preventative measure, we strongly urge you to take the following steps in order to prevent the exposure to West Nile Disease:

- Dispose of tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots or similar water holding containers that has accumulated on your property. Do not overlook containers that have become overgrown by aquatic vegetation.
- Pay special attention to discarded tires that may have accumulated on your property. Drill holes in the bottom of recycling containers that are left outdoors. Drainage holes that are located on the sides collect water for mosquitoes to breed in.
- Clean clogged roof gutters on an annual basis, particularly if the leaves from surrounding trees have a tendency to plug up the drains. Roof gutters are easily overlooked but can produce millions of mosquitoes each season.
- Turn over plastic wading pools when not in use. A wading pool becomes a mosquito producer if it is not used on a regular basis.
- Turn over wheelbarrows and do not allow water to stagnate in birdbaths. Both provide breeding habitat for domestic mosquitoes.
- Aerate ornamental pools or stock them with fish. Clean and chlorinate swimming pools that are not being used. Be aware that mosquitoes may even breed in the water that collects on swimming pool covers.
- Wear long sleeve shirts and pants when outdoors.
- During spring, summer and fall spray insect repellent on clothing and exposed skin in accordance with labeling instructions.
- Repair window and door screens.
- Avoid outdoor activities at dawn, dusk and during the evening hours.

In December of 2006, the Governing Body of the Borough of Lincoln Park Amended Chapter 157 Peddling and Soliciting, of our Code Book.

Included in this Amendment is a provision for a “Non-Solicitation List” which reads as follows:

1. “The Borough Clerk shall prepare and maintain a list of addresses of those premises where the owner and/or occupant has notified the Borough Clerk, in writing, that canvassing and soliciting is not permitted on the premises.
2. The Non-Solicitation list shall be updated by the Borough Clerk semi-annually, on January 1st, and July 1st of each year, based upon the non-solicitation notices received, and shall be supplied to all applicants for canvassing and soliciting permits, and any other person or organization requesting same.
3. The owner and/or occupant of premises identified on the non-solicitation list, upon registration therefore, may obtain a sign, placard or sticker from the Borough Clerk, which may be affixed to a front door, front window or front facing wall of the premises, and giving notice that canvassing and soliciting is not permitted on the premises.”

If you wish your address to be placed on this Non-Solicitation List, please complete the lower portion of this letter and mail, e-mail or fax back to me at your earliest convenience. Once I have received your form, a decal for your front door or window will be sent to you advising solicitors that you are on the non-solicitation list.
