## From the Desk of Mayor David Runfeldt

**Help Wanted:** Energetic and enthusiastic individuals are being sought by mayor of small, yet vibrant and proud community to serve on newly formed Citizen's Advisory Board. Individuals must be willing to work for the greater good of the community. Of particular interest are people who are not afraid to ask questions about "rumors around town", and more importantly, willing to report back to those around town when facts are revealed. Great value will be given to those who can bring the needs and concerns of the community to the mayor, council and administration with the hope of improving and creating programs, activities and services that will increase pride in the community. Interested individuals are asked to submit a letter of intent along with a brief statement about why you would like to be part of this opportunity.

One of the challenges of public service is balancing what you want for your small area, your block or your neighborhood versus the needs of the greater community. It is sometimes very hard to understand the needs of someone who lives miles away from you and exists in a different part of the community then you are involved in. Whether it is flooding, development, safety, traffic or any of the other issues that may affect your part of our community, it involves our total community.

Sometimes elected officials or borough employees are so focused on running what is already in place that we miss the opportunity to provide something new. Worse, is when the community (or someone in it) has a great idea for something new, but it never gets heard.

Often, in a small community such as ours, rumors are circulated that have very little basis in fact. On the other hand, often there is at least some factual basis to various rumors. It is important that we separate rumor from partial fact and complete fact. Decisions and opinions should be made in response to absolute fact, not unverified reports or idle speculation. This administration is committed to dispel gossip and rumors where there is no factual basis and pull out the fact from fiction where there are issues that need to be addressed...and then address them.

It is for these reasons that I am starting the "Citizen's Advisory Board" which I see as a means to help bridge the gap between what we are doing and what else we need to do. To help see the difference in what is being said around town and what is truly happening around town. To help each "part" of the community function within the "entirety" of the community.

I have approached several individuals who are quite receptive to serving on this committee. Rather than make it "by invitation only", I would like to open it up to everyone in town. I welcome interest from anyone regardless of age, education, employment or income. I would like to start with 2-4 people from each ward in town which would give us a Board of 8-16 members. Meetings will be held several times a year in order to discuss happenings and ideas that affect our community. If you are interested, please send your letter to my office or email me.

On another note, along with various scheduled meetings and appointments, I will now be available to all residents of town in my office on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the new municipal building on Tuesday mornings from 9:00am to noon and on Thursday evenings from 7:30-9:30pm. Please call (973) 270-2021 to set up an appointment or just stop in. I hope to see you!

The Lincoln Park Public Library is located at 12 Boonton Turnpike. Our hours of operation for the Summer are as follows: Monday – Thursday: 10am – 9pm; Friday: 10am – 5pm; Saturday 10am – 2pm; and Sunday: Closed.

The Summer Reading Program, “Get a Clue at your Library,” started the week of July 9<sup>th</sup> and will continue through August 10<sup>th</sup>. Registration began at the library on June 18<sup>th</sup>.

Some extra times have been added to the Summer Reading Program as well as an additional category. “Preschool Sleuths” will meet at the library on Tuesdays at 12:30pm; “Super Sleuths” will also meet on Thursdays at 2:30pm; and “Private Eyes” have added Wednesdays at 6:30pm.

All the 10:30am sessions in all categories remain open (as of July 9<sup>th</sup>) for those not enrolled in summer camp.

The library is now wireless. Cablevision has provided a number of free internet connections. Come to the library with your laptop and access the internet without plugging into an electrical outlet.

The BookLetters allow patrons to sign themselves up easily from the libraries’ websites for 21 email newsletters and information about the latest books, audiobooks, and information about authors. Fiction and non-fiction works are included, and there are lists for teens’ and childrens’ works, business, science fiction and fantasy, and book club choices.

NetLibrary eAudiobooks is a collection of over 1,500 downloadable audiobook best sellers, book club favorites and works by award winning authors that can be played on a wide range of desktop, laptop, and portable devices which support Windows Media Player (but not iPods). New titles are added each month, and all titles are available at all times. Patrons use the collection at no charge, since the service is supported by tax dollars. All MAIN cardholders will now have access to this service which has been available in some partner libraries for awhile.

## WARNING

### Leaving toddlers unsupervised may lead to a disaster

A 15 month old child was recently hospitalized after swallowing his grandmother’s diabetes medication. Since the child’s grandmother was only visiting for a couple of days, she thought it would be okay to leave her medications out on the nightstand by the bed. To make matters worse, some of these medications were moved from their original containers to non-child-resistant containers. The easy accessibility turned into a perfect scenario for disaster. Unfortunately, this is an all-to-common occurrence in homes.

The NJ Poison Information and Education System (NJPIES) warns parents and grandparents of the importance of keeping medicines and personal toiletries away from children. Always offer your visitors a safe place to store their medications and personal materials. The following are some helpful tips for travelers:

- Store medication and personal supplies in locked suitcases or containers
- Always keep medications and supplies in their original, child-resistant containers
- Do not refer to medicine as “Candy”

The Poison Control Hotline number 1-800-222-1222 can be used for treatment advice for emergency poisonings as well as for non-emergency questions regarding medications, household products, plants, etc.

# Winners of Mayors Wellness Campaign

Over 200 lbs were lost overall by participants, but it was the police department that "captured" the individual and team prize when it was over.

The individual winner received a year-long family membership (donated) to the Lakeland YMCA and the winning team received a healthy luncheon, Hawaiian style. All participants gained better awareness on the lifelong health benefits of being fit.

# News From Hose Co. #1

The world turns every day and brings new changes to everyone. The biggest change for Hose Co. #1 will be that we are moving into the new five-bay firehouse. We expect to be operating from this building by the time you read this.

The new firehouse will have a radio room, officers' rooms and a meeting room. Three bays will be occupied by fire trucks. One bay will be used for rescue boats and the fifth bay will house a surplus army vehicle used for flood rescues.

This is the third fire house for Lincoln Park. The first one was located on the road where Cost Cutters is now located. It was a wooden two bay building. It stood next to the Borough Hall, Police Station and Court Office and all the other departments that could be squeezed into several small offices.

There were three fire engines in the two bay firehouse. A 1939 Pirsch Pumper, a WW2 surplus International Army fire truck and a converted oil tanker truck used to carry water. There were no fire hydrants at the time. The International was parked behind the tanker truck. At times, especially in cold weather, the tanker would not start. The responding firemen would all get behind the truck and push to get it started.

One of the many stories as told by former Chief Fred Caldera was that before there was an oil burner furnace, heat in the building consisted of a coal stove. During the winter, the members would take turns going to the firehouse to shovel coal into the stove and clean out the ashes. In order to cut the fire budget, a former Mayor suggested that by putting anti-freeze in the water tanks, they could save buying a ton of coal. It didn't happen.

Flood rescue consisted of an old wooden boat on a homemade trailer. It took about an hour in the water for the wood to swell so that the boat would stop leaking.

Because there was no full time police dispatcher, fire calls were taken by Henrie DeVries at his bar across the street.

The building is still there. He would then blow the one fire siren located behind the firehouse. Then he would go outside and give the fire location to the first fireman to show up.

Since not everyone could hear the fire siren, the firemen's wives, upon hearing the alarm, would get on the telephone and call other firemen (or their wives) to alert them about the fire call. With a manual telephone service (no dial or touchtone), the telephone operators also know when Lincoln Park had a fire.

So much for the good old days...now we have electronic paging, fire trucks that start, fire hydrants, boats that float and a new firehouse to serve our community.

We are still a volunteer organization and we can always use dedicated members. So, if you are thinking about joining us, come and visit us. We guarantee that you won't have to push the trucks to get them going.

## HURRICANE SEASON IS HERE—June through September ARE YOU READY?



We all know that the hurricane season has started – the question is – are you prepared in the event that either a hurricane or tropical storm hits Lincoln Park?

Tropical Storms (Floyd was a tropical storm when it hit in 1999) and hurricanes can do significant damage and bring with them the following hazards: Flash flooding, river and stream flooding, wind damage, power outages. Here are some quick tips:

**Flash Flooding:** Remember, when a roadway is under water “Turn Around, Don’t Drown”. If you are experiencing flash flooding in your area keep a careful eye on the situation. If the water is encroaching your property please be sure you move important papers and personal belongings above ground level. Make sure that all light lawn furniture is secured. Do not attempt to drive through the water – wait until it recedes.

**River and Stream Flooding:** River and Stream flooding lasts much longer and has a greater chance of impact on personal property. If the streams and/or rivers are rising keep a close eye on the situation. Resources are listed below that will help you in determining what the situation is and what the potential might be. If evacuation is necessary please remember that we will do assisted evacuations only during daylight hours unless there is a medical emergency. It is always best to plan an evacuation route and prepare for evacuation ahead of time. Our shelter will be open during any tropical storm or hurricane event.

**Wind Damage:** Wind can cause a great deal of damage to your property. Take a look at your property and see if there are any trees that might be a problem during high winds. You may find it useful to take proactive steps if a condition exists that could damage your home or your neighbor’s property. If you are going on vacation – or if a storm is predicted – please be sure to secure all lawn furniture and ornaments. Umbrellas, chairs, etc. can break windows and can damage cars when they are airborne.

**Power Outages:** Downed trees and wires can cause power outages that last for a long time. Should your power go out, shut off all appliances that were on with the exception of one light. This will let you know when the power comes back. Be sure you have surge protectors for all audio and video equipment as well as computers. Make sure that such equipment is powered down during an outage. Use only battery operated lamps and flashlights for lighting. Make sure you have a source to boil water that does not require electricity. Make sure you have water available since the storm may affect water pressure. **Cordless phones** do not operate during a power outage. The “old fashioned” phones will still be operable if telephone lines are unaffected. See if you can find an old one somewhere in the attic or basement and keep it handy. Be sure you have a car charger for cell phones as the outage may well last longer than the battery on your phone. **Refrigerators and freezers** should be kept closed as much as possible. Each time they are opened lessens the amount of time the food will stay good. Make sure all food from refrigerators and/or freezers is checked before using.

**Good things to have on hand:** bottled water; a hand operated can opener; lanterns, flashlights (battery operated); a portable radio; canned foods that do not require cooking.

- If you have Verizon phone service at home you may receive a “Reverse 9-1-1” call with recorded information. PLEASE do not hang up-listen to the message-this is information that you need to know.
